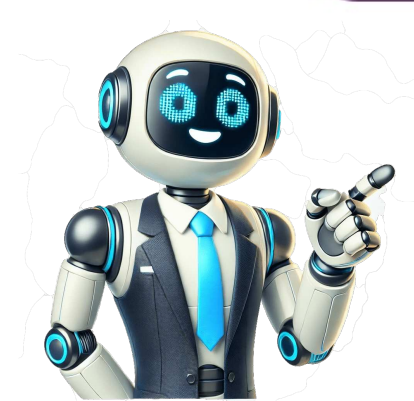

On the other hand, notify tends to be more about alerting or making someone aware of a fact or situation without necessarily providing extensive background or details.When you inform someone, you might engage in a more comprehensive communication, often expecting a response or interaction. Notify is generally used with a direct object and often used with prepositions like "about" or "of".The choice between inform and notify can also reflect the urgency of the message.
